Tasha is a very active person in our community. She started volunteering at Tillamook Early



The Year in Review

On July 1 we started a new year. It is always interesting to reflect back on the prior year's accomplishments and challenges. Last year was certainly exciting with many things happening. We served 77 individuals in our vocational program, 16 individuals in our two group homes, and 24 individuals in our two group homes, and 24 individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. As individuals age, more medical needs occur. Our residential programs took individuals to 432 medical appoint-



dical appointments. Today, those with disabilities live a longer and fulfilling life because of the care they receive. Meeting those needs and supporting these individuals remains a top priority. In the last year we were

able to provide respite and crisis services, to those in our community totalling 171 days at our Madrona House group home.

By year's end, we employed 49 staff serving individuals in our vocational and residential programs. Staffing sustainability is crucial in services like ours and we have been very fortunate in this area with many staff who have been with us for a long time. The average tenure of our staff is about 10 years.

In the past year we have seen a rapidly changing service system and an evolution in how community-based services are provided. An example of that being the increased emphasis on development of competitive employment opportunities for those with intellectual and developmental disabilities. As it is every year, transportation remains a crucial element for us in meeting the needs of those we serve. We traveled 97,348 miles in serving individuals in the past year. We anticipate this increasing to over 100,000 miles during this year. Helping us last year was the acquisition of a new bus that was paid for through grants, as well as the acquisition of a vehicle for our Supported Living program. This vehicle was purchased through donations and a contribution from the Marie Mills Foundation.

Maintaining our infrastructure also kept us busy in the past year. Staffing is a crucial part of our infrastructure,

and with massive system changes that came from the state we saw as a increased workload for all of our staff. We began increasing staffing to meet this need.



We were also very busy last year maintaining our facilities through a number physical improvements and repairs. We repaired siding rot and installed a sidewalk at our Madrona House group home. We addressed improvements

and repairs in the bathrooms at our Nestucca House group home, to name a few.

It was a very busy year as you see, and our current year promises to be just as busy. Goals for the coming year include continued enhancement of our staffing infrastructure, continuing to focus and build upon the development of competitive employment opportunities in our vocational program, continued development and enhancement of our residential program, and continuing to advance and embrace technology to make our jobs easier.

Fixing Things

Anyone who has ever owned a home knows that a lot of time, effort, and money goes into keeping it in good repair. Every summer Marie Mills Center has a planned maintenance program to address facility needs. This past summer we replaced gutters, downspouts, and facia wraps at our Nestucca House group home. Often times when you dig into a project you find unanticipated problems and this was the case with this project. Upon removing facia wraps, the contractor found rotten facia which had to be replaced. This problem was addressed and new gutters, downspouts and facia wraps were installed at that home. Another project this summer included having all three facilities thoroughly pressure washed. And, our largest project this summer was removing old and degraded concrete in the parking lot of our vocational facility on Front Street. Several panels of concrete had aged and degraded to the point that they had become a safety hazard to anyone walking on it. In all, three large concrete panels requiring about 27 yards of concrete were replaced.


