A Look Back In Time

Dr. Helen Benscheidt, a founder of Marie Mills Center, sent us this old photo taken in 1969 causing us to pause and reflect proudly on our history, and how we got to where are today. The formation of Marie Mills Center in 1969 was inspired by Helen's niece - Marie Mills

who had a disability. In 1969 community-based services for the intellectually and developmentally disabled was in its infancy stage with most services for these individuals being provided through institutions. Back then there was little if any funding available to get these individuals into community programs that were forming, and there were no road maps on how to do it. Through Helen's family, others, and Marie's inspiration the Marie

Mills Center was formed. It was not easy, but with dedication anything was possible. The startup of Marie

Mills Center in 1969 occurred with nine individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities served by volunteer staff, some which were our founders. Because of these founders, today Marie Mills Center serves nearly 90 individuals with intellectual and developmental dis-

abilities through a variety of services. In discussing the early history of Marie Mills Center with Helen she remarked "several of us had barbecue fundraisers at our houses and invited friends to come and share and contribute. Many times we would make \$100. Of course all of these friends knew about our endeavor". This photo from 1969 is from one of those barbecue fundraisers. Marie Mills Center thanks its founders for

Our Year In Review

2016/2017 was a very busy year. We serve a population increasing in age and medical needs. **Medical support for those in our programs has become a priority** over the years. In the past year, we took individuals served to a total of **386 medical appointments**. In the past five years alone, individuals were taken to a total of 1,940 medical appointments.



We serve individuals through three different programs. Our Day Support Activity program provides non-employment services which includes helping individuals access their community, individuals with intense support needs and individuals who have retired from working.

The National and State emphasis on Employment Services has resulted in tremendous change for community-based providers over the past several years. Our Employment Services program consists of Employment Path services which served 37 individuals in 2016/2017. These services are preparatory to competitive employment services. In this program Job Discovery Services occur helping the individual decide on their desired type of employment. Once that is accomplished we seek out a position and ultimately placement into competitive employment. In the past year we placed 5 individuals into competitive employment and by year's end we were providing job coaching support to 14 individuals in competitive employment.

Our Residential Services program includes our Nestucca House and Madrona House group homes and a Supported Living program. The ultimate goal for individuals in group homes is to move into more integrated and independent settings with assistance from our Supported Living program. In 2016/2017 we served a total of 45 individuals in our residential programs.

The Madrona House group home is currently home to 10 individuals. We have developed a plan to down-size it to 8 individuals, moving two individuals into our newly formed Trask House. This home will be a staffed apartment setting. These changes promise to better serve those within our program and be more cost effective than our present structure.

Within the field today, **employee retention** is the most serious issue facing providers and is only amplified when one considers a rapidly changing field with increased provider and staff responsibilities. We are extremely fortunate to have the employees we have and the relative stability compared to other providers in the State who have experienced over 70% turnover annually. Our staff perform admirably in their roles. They are heroes that tirelessly support those we serve.

It has been a busy few months for us at Marie Mills Center taking advantage of the nice summer weather to

accomplish several planned larger projects. We completed the Nestucca House generator project which resulted in a 30,000 watt generator being installed. This project will



enable individuals to shelter in place during times of lost power due to emergency situations, which often happen in Tillamook County. With this project being completed both residential facilities now have this capacity. We have replaced all interior and exterior lighting at all of our facilities through the Tillamook PUD Commercial Lighting program. Previous lighting was antiquated and insufficient. New lighting is LED and much more energy efficient. We also completed the parking lot replacement at our Front Street facility. The previous cement parking lot was cracked and posed trip hazards.
